

Steps to Make Your Voice Heard In the 2022 Election!

GET REGISTERED - If you haven't yet cast your ballot, there is still time to exercise your right to have your voice heard. Here are some tips for making sure your vote is counted:

* VERIFY THAT YOU'RE REGISTERED TO VOTE AND LEARN IF YOUR POLLING LOCATION CHANGED:

- Go to https://mi.gov/vote Here you can confirm your voter registration status; your polling place and hours; view a sample ballot; and track your absentee ballot.
- You can vote if you are homeless or if you have completed a jail or prison sentence or are in jail waiting for trial. Go to the above website for more information.

* iF YOU'RE NOT REGISTERED, DO SO ASAP:

- To register to vote on-line, click this link: https://mvic.sos.state.mi.us/RegisterVoter/Index
- Register by mail deadline: October 24th. Mail your registration form to the address on the registration form.
- Michigan law allows same day registration. If you've never registered before, go to your clerk's office before 8 p.m. on voting day and register to vote with a proof of residency.

*LEARN ABOUT THE CANDIDATES AND FIND OUT WHAT'S ON YOUR BALLOT:

- Click <u>Vote411.org</u> to visit the Michigan League of Women Voters on-line voter's guide. It
 provides background on all the candidates on your ballot and information on ballot issues.

* VOTE!

- Go to this website to learn about your options for applying for an absentee ballot: https://www.michigan.gov/sos/all-services/absentee-ballot
- You can mail your absentee ballot (postmarked) by October 24th or you can take your ballot to a drop box near your clerk's office. Go to www.mi.gov/vote to learn the drop box location for you. You can also take your absentee ballot to your clerk's office.
- Or you can vote in person -- the traditional way -- at your polling plkace on November 8th!
